

PROTECT ACCESS TO QUALITY CARE

- A physician anesthesiologist-surveyor contracted with the California Department of Public Health is targeting Central Valley hospitals and spreading misinformation to discredit Certified Registered Nurse Anesthetists (CRNAs).
- Nearly 1,000 procedures have been unnecessarily cancelled, delayed, or transferred, severely impacting the health and welfare of Central Valley residents.
 80% of these cases are Medi-Cal or Medicare enrollees.
- CDPH surveys help ensure effective, safe, and quality care within California health care facilities; however, without proper oversight, these surveys can be leveraged to negatively impact patient access to care.
- Other CDPH surveyors operating statewide have **never raised an issue with CRNA scope of practice.**
- CRNAs are extensively trained, educated, and qualified anesthesia experts.
- CRNAs are safe and provide the same outcomes as anesthesiologists. (Negrusa et al, Medical Care Journal, 2016; Dulisse, 2010-Health Affairs; Lewis, 2014-Cochrane Database of Systematic Reviews)
- CDPH must conduct an investigation into the actions of the physician anesthesiologist-surveyor and the alleged collusion with the California Society of Anesthesiologists.

CRNAs provide anesthesia care independently in the 51 counties (94%) where surgical, obstetric, and trauma services are provided.

CRNAs are the sole anesthesia providers in four rural counties (Colusa, Lassen, Modoc, and Trinity) and provide 80%+ of rural anesthesia nationwide.

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In 2009, California became the 15th state to "opt-out" of physician supervision, enabling CRNAs to bill Medi-Cal as independent providers. Now, there are 25 "opt-out" states.

CRNAs undergo almost a decade of education & training to become specialists in anesthesiology, including at least 2 years of critical care nursing.
